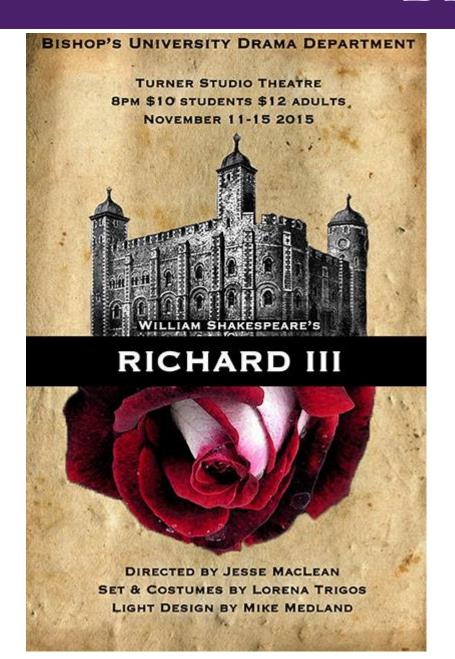

#### 2016-17 Capital Plan

- An audit was performed by an external firm to evaluate the rate of decay of Bishop's buildings eligible for PQI funding (excludes residences, the arena, the golf course, the Knowlton building, etc.).
- The rate of decay is:

Estimated cost of deferred maintenance

Total value of the buildings

- The rate of decay for public buildings is expected to be below 15%. Bishop's rate of decay is 28%.
- Based on the current amount of PQI funding allocated annually to Bishop's (appr. \$4.5 million), it will take 10 years to reach the 15%.

#### **Information Technology**

- The ITS team has developed a three-year plan for our information technology systems (applications).
- The investment required is \$2M and will be funded by the operating fund over the next ten years (part of our recovery plan).

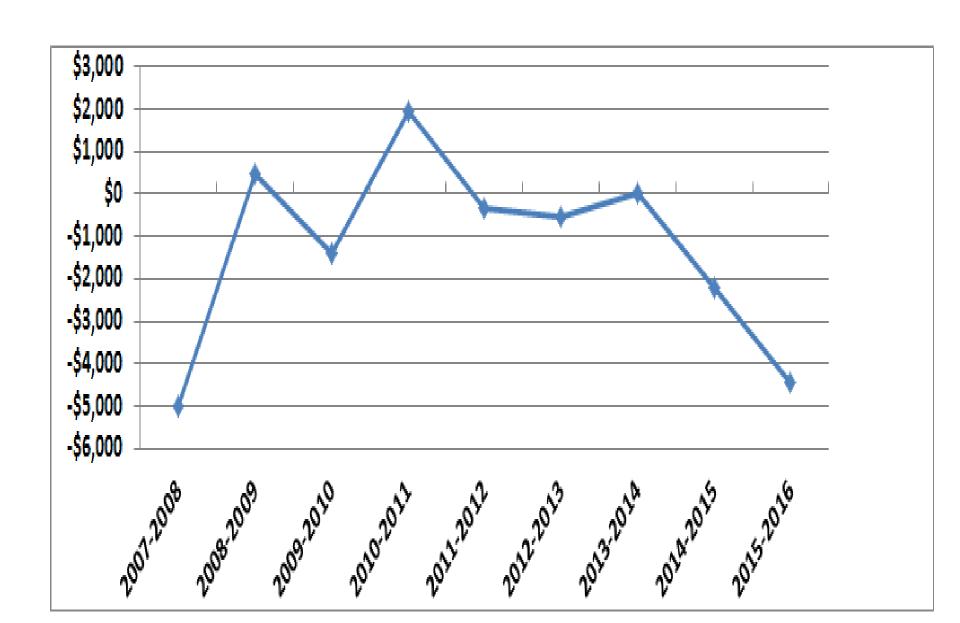

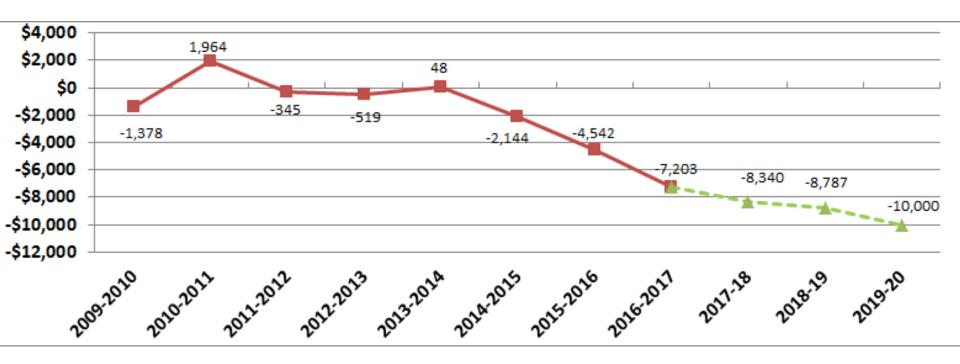

# Guiding Financial Principles

- 1. Within five years, each area of the University will operate on a self-sustaining basis.
- 2. The Academic budget will be determined by the funds received through the teaching grant and a portion of tuition and student fees.
- 3. As is the case now, the student services budget will be covered primarily by the fees paid by the students.



# Guiding Financial Principles

- 4. The Ancillary Services budget will be determined by the revenue generated by those services. Net revenues from Ancillary Services will be reinvested in these services, including the cost of renovating and maintaining the residences and other facilities.
- 5. The Administration operations will be organised to support the University's priorities and the budget will be determined by the funds provided by government for this purpose.

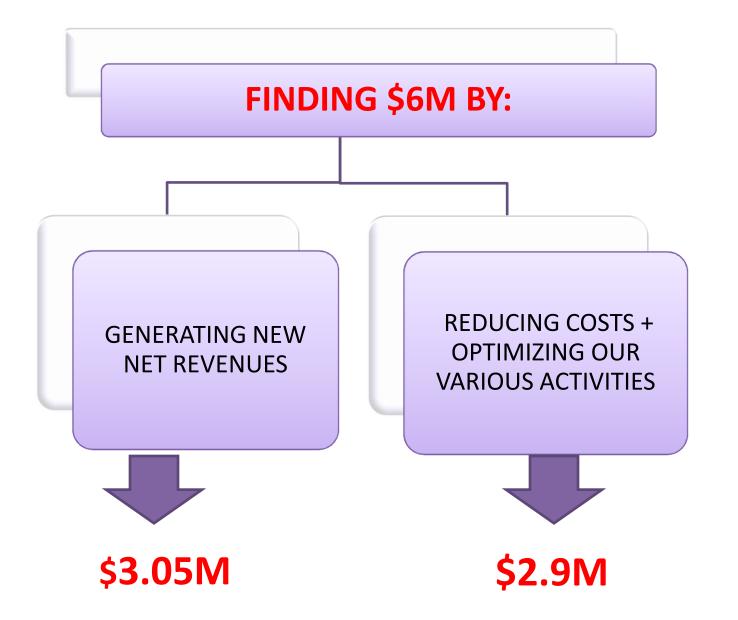

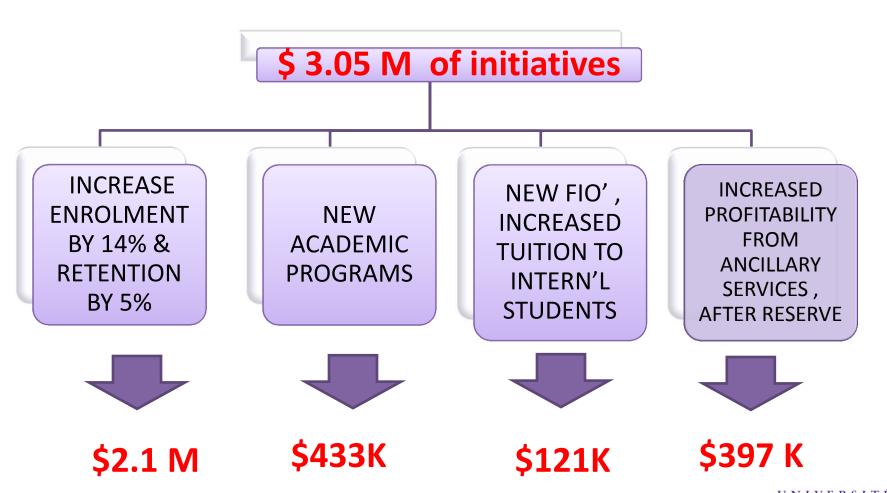

#### GENERATING NEW NET REVENUES

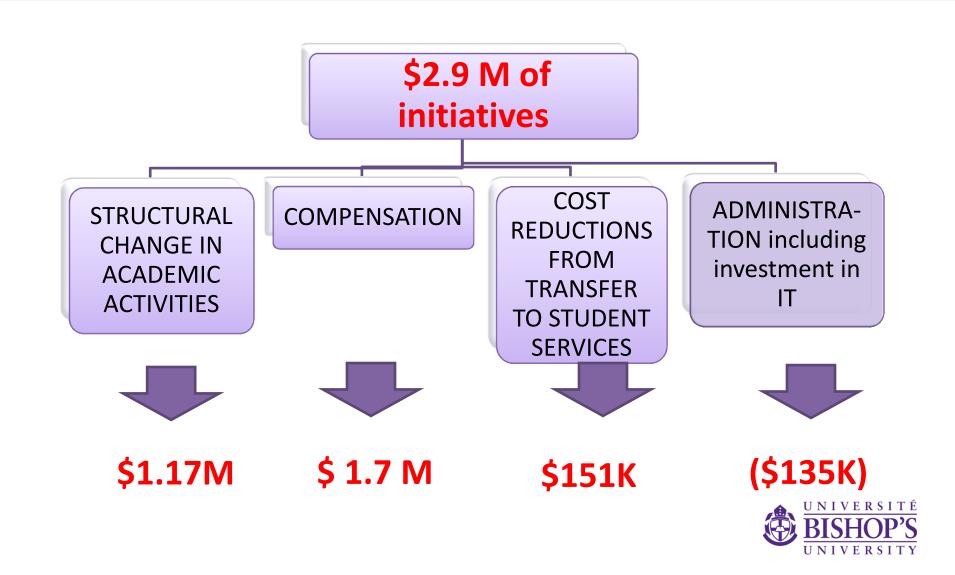
(in year 5: 2019-20)

#### **ACADEMIC SECTOR**

## Academic programs

- One of our guiding principles is that our academic programs must operate with the funding provided to them by the government funding formula
- Our priority will be to build the delivery of our academic programs primarily – but not exclusively – around full-time faculty
- 3. One of the Task Force's key conclusions was that we have too few students for the number of classes we offer

## Academic programs

- 4. The Task Force recommended that we develop a model for determining how best to allocate our full-time and part-time faculty resources.
- 5. Under Brad Willms' leadership a new resource allocation model (RAM) has been developed and will be presented to Senate next fall.
- 6. The RAM score is an educational tool to help our academic units understand their financial health and to create an incentive to optimize resources.

#### Academic sector

- 7. It is evident that it is more financially advantageous to have a professor teaching 100 students in a class than 10 students.
- 8. It is less intuitive that two professors each teaching different classes of 30 students may generate very different amounts of revenue.

#### Academic sector

- 9. The reason for this is that the government funding model provides more funds for some students, eg. physics than others eg. business.
- 10.We want to give our academic departments the information, incentives and autonomy to organize their academic offerings in a financially efficient way.

### Resource Allocation Model (RAM)

- 11. More resources will be directed towards areas that serve the greatest number of students.
- 12. Larger academic units will be asked to contribute to the overall financial stability of the University by subsidizing other important, foundational yet less popular and less well funded academic units.
- 13. But all academic units must improve their financial situation (some will be less deficitary, others will break even and others will become profitable or more profitable).

#### Revised new curricular model

- Goal: a more streamlined, inspiring, structured and prescribed curriculum that:
  - reduces the need for so many courses,
  - maintains focus on liberal education,
  - includes all current academic areas,
  - works differently with what we have already.

# Three components

- 1) Four large interdisciplinary foundational courses, done by all students;
- 2) A distribution requirement students take one course in some or all of these areas:
  - > The creative arts
  - > English language and literature
  - > Additional languages
  - ➤ Math, natural science and computer science
  - ➤ Individuals and society (e.g., Economics, Environmental Studies, Sports Studies, Psychology, Sociology, Political Studies, Business, Education);
  - ➤ Liberal arts foundations including Liberal Arts, Philosophy, Classics, Religion, History and Art History.
- 3) Capstone or culminating experience (taken for credit) that requires application of their learning and competencies beyond the classroom.

# Attracting more students: School of the Liberal Arts

- The Task Force recommended establishing a Liberal Arts School encompassing the departments of Classical Studies, Religion, Philosophy, and the program of Liberal Arts (and perhaps others).
- Focus on rebranding and attracting more students to these foundational yet unsubscribed areas

# Increase pondération mix: Graduate programming

- While Bishop's principal focus will remain undergraduate education, we will
  - A) double graduate-level FTE within five years
  - B) sustain and grow existing Master programs and certificates
  - C) Create a small number of new niche programs which will generate new net revenues- focus on Master of Arts programs in Humanities and Social Sciences and new graduate certificates.

# Reduce the number of duplicate and triplicate sections

- In 2015-16, there were 39 courses that had duplicate or triplicate sections for a total of 84 sections (24 courses are in Business; 2 in Education; 11 in humanities; 2 in social sciences)
- Theoretically, if every course were reduced to one section only, we would save 45 sections or \$420K
- May need larger classrooms or utilize existing spaces optimally

## Next steps and timelines

- A revised resource allocation formula (including RAM score tool) will be presented to Senate in October, 2016
- Foundational courses: ad-hoc committee will bring recommendations to Senate in November, 2016
- School of Liberal Arts: recommendation in fall, 2016
- Graduate programming: working groups set up at divisional level with progress report due in October, 2016

# Guiding principle

The budget for Administration will be determined primarily by the funds received through the fixed portion of the teaching support grant and a portion of tuition fees.

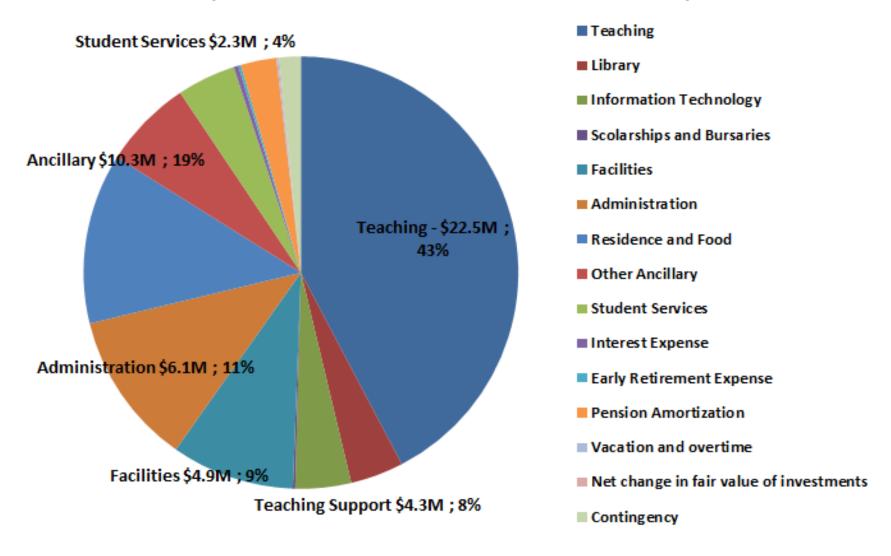
#### Administration costs

- Salaries and benefits represent 70% of the administrative costs
- Other expenses represent 30% such as:
  - Recruitment and promotion costs
  - Maintenance and repairs supplies
  - Insurance, electricity
  - Convocation, membership dues (e.g. BCI and Universities Canada)
  - Professional fees (auditors, actuary, legal fees)

# Administration costs as a % of University's Budget

- Spending on administration in 2016-17, is projected to be 11% of the University's expenditures.
- Excluding student recruitment costs, it will be 9% of the total operating expenditures of the University in 2016-17. (It was 10.4% in 2008-09.)

# Our ratio of administrators to number of students has remained constant

- In 2008-09, 1700 students = 36.7 administrative positions including management (.02 positions per student )
- In 2015-16, 2347 students = 47.3 administrative positions including management ( .02 positions per student )
- Net increase of 10.6 positions in the last 8 years primarily in recruitment and advancement.

# We have directed any increases in administrative spending primarily on student recruitment and fundraising

 Recruitment costs represent 22% of the total administration costs (increase from 15% in 2008-09)

 Advancement costs represent 14% of the total administration costs (same in 2008-09)

 Other administrative expenses represent 64% of total administration costs (down from 73% in 2008-09)

- We have merged three directors positions (Finance, IT and B&G) into one AVP position;
- We will cut \$100,000 in expenses in all administrative departments.

- 2. We have fewer people in administration than any of the other small universities in the regions.
- 3. The ratio of administrators to students has remained constant.
- 4. New positions and increased spending have been primarily in recruitment and advancement.
- 5. Our administrators earn less than at other Quebec universities.

- The student services budget will be covered by the fees paid by the students (\$2.2M in 2015-16)
- These fees are regulated by the Government, and any increases beyond the annual increase in household incomes in Quebec must be negotiated with representatives of our students.
- Compulsory student fees at Bishop's are already among the highest in Quebec

Students are assessed \$27.50 per credit to fund the following:

- Athletics and Intramurals
- Counselling
- 60% of the cost of the Office of the Dean of Students
- Health Services
- Transfers to Business Office, ITS and HR for the services provided to Student Services.

- Career Services
- University Success Coach
- Accessibility and Accommodation Services
- Sexual Health Coordinator
- Student Safety
- A portion of Campus Ministry

- No other university pays for their athletics programs entirely from student service fees;
- A portion of the cost of these programs is covered by the operating budget at other universities.
- In the sustainability plan, more expenses such as student safety, additional 10% of the Dean of Students Affairs budget, increased sports centre fees have been taken on by the students' budget

## **Ancillary Services**

- The Ancillary Services budget will be determined by the revenue generated by those services. It will have to generate sufficient net revenues to cover the cost of renovating and maintaining the residences.
- A strategic review was done by RCGT in 2012
- Some recommandations have been implemented since then, and others are under analysis

### Other questions asked

- 1) Who is on the Executive Team (i.e. Senior Administration)?
- 2) Why are there three VPs and an Assistant VP?
- 3) How is the University funded, and what are the funding envelopes?
- 4) What is the justification for certain administrative expenses, (i.e. Consultants, head hunters, legal fees, travel & accommodation, Board of governors expenses, Communications, Web site and recruitment)?
