



With fewer than 3,000 full-time students, Bishop's is considered a small university. But what does “small” mean? “Small” means that you get a personalized educational experience that works for you. It means that we take the time. It means that we can provide a 23:1 student-to-teacher ratio. Your teachers call on you by name and you get to know your fellow students. Staff at Dewhurst Dining Hall (Dewies) might remember that you like two scoops, not one, and circulation clerks at the Library Learning Commons might ask you if you liked the last book you borrowed. We care! You become a valued and respected member of the school community who is seen, heard, and appreciated.

Despite being small, we offer the academic reputation, student life, athletics, extracurriculars, and experiential learning opportunities typical of far larger universities with the warmth and homey feel that can be afforded only by a school of smaller stature. Our current teaching faculty comprises three 3M National Teaching Fellows, and we have awarded 15 Rhodes Scholarships to graduates since our founding. We know that access to research and co-op opportunities, experiential learning, internships, practicums, and job shadowing are important considerations when deciding where to pursue your education. At Bishop's, we connect classroom theory to real-life practice in a range of disciplines. Our graduates are highly skilled and expertly equipped for the challenges that await them when they leave our campus, and they find work all around the world.

B.U. on a Budget

We know that funding your education can be challenging. That's why we offer merit-based scholarships and bursaries, financial prizes and awards, need-based financial aid, paid research and internship opportunities, and student employment on campus.

Sweep the Victories

Whether you like to play a pickup game of frisbee for fun or a rugby match to win, B.U. Athletics has a team that you'll be proud to play for. Our Gaiters Women's Hockey team are 2025 USports National Champions, and our Gaiters Men's Football team won the prestigious Atlantic University Sport Loney Bowl in 2024, a first for the team. Love Purple, but Go Green

Preservation, carbon neutrality, sustainable agriculture, and waste management aren't just buzzwords at Bishop's. We serve only Fairtrade-certified coffee and hot chocolate. We've planted 10,500 native tree species since 2020. We convert ageing trees into inclusive architecture. We attained carbon neutrality nearly a decade earlier than we pledged. We're a *VéloSympathique* bronze-certified campus. With Gaiter Gears, you can rent a bike to ride around town and campus. Two regular city bus lines connect the campus to the greater Sherbrooke area, and you can even take an inter-city bus from campus to Montréal.





New Indigenous Student Gathering Space within Kwigw8mna

Inaugurated in March 2025, Kwigw8mna houses the Indigenous Student Support Centre, an Indigenous student study space, gathering spaces, and an Indigenous research lab, marking a significant step in the ongoing commitment to Indigenous student support, truth, and reconciliation.

Meaning “our house and yours” in Abenaki, Kwigw8mna transforms Divinity House, a building once associated with training clergy, into a space where Indigenous students gather, learn, and find support. The space reflects Indigenous perspectives, traditions, and needs, fostering a sense of belonging while creating opportunities for cross-cultural understanding.


“The opening of Kwigw8mna is a moment of both reflection and renewal,” says Vicky Boldo, Associate Director of Indigenous Initiatives. “This

building carries a complicated history, and today, it stands as a place of healing, strength, and Indigenous leadership. It is a tangible commitment to making Bishop’s a place where Indigenous students feel seen, supported, and valued.”

For Indigenous students, Kwigw8mna represents more than a gathering space. “Kwigw8mna is a new home away from home,” says Casey Goodleaf, a third-year Elementary Education student with a minor in Indigenous Studies at Bishop’s. “It can be hard to be away from community, but this will be a space that helps create one here. A place to gather and share our stories, ideas, and culture.”

Bishop's is an English-language university in a francophone city. But what if your French is rusty or you don't speak French at all?

No worries. Roughly 50% of our students arrive on campus not knowing how to speak *la langue de Molière*. Bishop's is an English-language university, and all services on campus are offered in English so you don't have to worry about your interactions with faculty and staff. However, you can choose to practise your French on campus and participate in cultural and social outings with the French department if you want to. Plus, you'll meet students from across Canada and around the world with whom you can practise your French. Bishop's offers full-degree programs in French for francophones and non-francophones, as well as new micro-certificates in French as a Second Language. The Bishop's Exceptional Student Talent (B.E.S.T.) Project Fund is the premier experiential learning opportunity at Bishop's University. In 2010, a Bishop's graduate made a commitment to establish this opportunity fund at the University, and students have been making the most of it ever since. This unique fund is meant to assist students in exploring career paths and realizing their passions. It also gives students the chance to enhance their learning outside the classroom.

Project funding is awarded to students whom the selection committee believes have the potential for significant achievement and impact once they graduate from Bishop's. Do you have an ambition or a passion that you would like to realize? We encourage you to be one of our B.E.S.T.! Here are examples of projects that have been funded in recent years:

- A psychology student spent the summer at Oxford University working in a pain research laboratory.
- A drama and fine arts student attended and performed in the Edinburgh Fringe festival.
- An environmental studies and sustainable agriculture and food systems student went to Iceland to participate in The GREEN Program focusing on sustainability, geology, bio-fuels, and geothermal energy.
- A biodiversity and ecology student worked at an animal rehabilitation centre in Peru.
- A history and global studies student worked on a major archaeological excavation site in ancient Corinth, Greece.
- A business student took part in the New York City Investment Banking Immersion Program.
- An education student started a summer camp in Uganda for 50 youth living with AIDS.
- A classical studies student participated in an intensive mosaic course taught in Ravenna, Italy.
- A chemistry student interned in Germany researching gold complexes as anticancer drugs.
- A political studies student participated in a three-week study tour of the European Union.
- An English literature student worked on an Abenaki language revitalization project using AI software.
- An international studies student secured a summer internship in a law firm in China while taking intensive Mandarin lessons.





Our newest 93-bed residence welcomed its first students in 2022! These modified bog-style units provide more common space in each unit and shared in-unit bathrooms, while maintaining the privacy of separate single rooms. Building facilities include a natural light room, yoga/Zen relaxation room, multimedia movie and gaming room, large assembly hall, common kitchen, lounges and study spaces on each floor, and a large game room equipped with a pool table. Nestled amongst beautiful oak and willow trees, this residence is our most modern and most accessible residence on campus.

Paterson Hall

This residence offers suites with four bedrooms, two bathrooms, a kitchen, and living room in each unit. Students living in this style can opt for one of our meal plans or choose to cook for themselves. Paterson is adjacent to the New Side residences, golf course, Peter Curry marsh, and hiking trails.

MacKinnon

Mackinnon is a traditional-style residence that houses approximately 115 students. Situated in the social centre of campus, "Mack" is a stone's throw from practically everything at Bishop's. This traditional-style residence with single and double rooms is perfect for first-year students wanting to get involved and be part of the Bishop's community.

Residence Fees

We guarantee residence for first-year, full-degree undergraduate students who meet the June 15, 2026, application deadline. The fees for the full academic year (September 2025 to April 2026) are listed below (all pricing is Canadian dollars). In addition to accommodation and dining fees, a mandatory \$70/month residence service fee is also applied. This all-inclusive fee includes in-room high-speed Internet, a local telephone connection, and unlimited laundry access.

Good to know...

Our research demonstrates that first-year students living in on-campus residence have **GGPA's that are 5% higher** than those of first-year students who live off campus.

Living in residence will save you approximately 17 hours per week. You won't need to buy groceries, prepare food, do dishes, or commute, which saves. That is 17 hours (1,020 minutes!) each week that you can spend cultivating friendships, participating in clubs and activities, learning new skills, uplevelling your academic pursuits, and/or working part time.

Meal Plans

All students living in either traditional or bog-style residence must choose from one of the following meal plans. (Students assigned to Paterson Hall may choose to be exempt from a meal plan.) Pricing is for a full academic year (September 2025 to April 2026).

The Flexible Diner – Full access to the Dewies' Continuous Dining Experience; \$9.50 per day to use at the Purple Pod from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., Monday to Thursday; \$25 per semester to use on retail or at Doolittle's; and two Dewies guest meal passes per semester: \$6,448.

The Square Mealer – Experience; \$9.50 per day to use at the Purple Pod from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., Monday to Thursday; \$25 per semester to use on retail or at Doolittle's; \$47 in dining dollars per semester to use at campus dining venues; and four Dewies guest meal passes per semester: \$6,544.

The Hearty Eater – Full access to the Dewies' Continuous Dining Experience; \$9.50 per day to use at the Purple Pod from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., Monday to Thursday; \$25 per semester to use on retail or at Doolittle's; \$83 in dining dollars per semester to use at campus dining venues; and eight Dewies guest meal passes per semester: \$6,616.





Financial Matters



Through the help of government, alumni, current students, faculty and staff, the Bishop's Foundation, corporations, and private donors, **over 63% of our students receive financial assistance** through scholarships, awards, grants, bursaries, and loans. You don't need to be at the top of your class or the most involved student to be eligible. We have hundreds of scholarships and awards that have a wide variety of requirements...you never know what you might receive!

Scholarships, Awards, and Bursaries

At Bishop's, we have two main categories for all entering undergraduate students: competitive admission scholarships and awards and bursaries.

Competitive Scholarships (merit based, determined during the admission process)

Our scholarships range in value from **\$1,000 to \$10,000** per academic year. Some are renewable throughout your studies at Bishop's, while others are one-time awards that you can receive either as a new student or a continuing student. To be considered, all you need to do is **complete your online application for admission by March 1, 2026**.

Michael Goldbloom Excellence Scholarship

The Michael Goldbloom Excellence Scholarship is the most prestigious scholarship available at Bishop's. It is valued at **\$10,000** per academic year and renewable for up to three years for students entering from CEGEP (**\$30,000**) or up to four years for students entering from a Canadian high school (**\$40,000**). Applicants must combine academic excellence with strong leadership, entrepreneurship, and community engagement. Online applications are due **March 1, 2026** and all supporting documents must be submitted no later than **March 15, 2026**.

Awards and Bursaries

Our awards and bursaries range in value from **\$500 to \$12,000** per academic year. Most of these awards and bursaries are one-time and non-renewable. To be considered, all you need to do is **complete your online application for admission and the online awards and bursaries application by March 1, 2026**. We make awards and bursaries offers in mid-April. In addition to academic merit, these awards may also consider leadership, extra-curricular activities, community involvement, and financial need.

Bourses d'excellence Michael Goldbloom

Les Bourses d'excellence Michael Goldbloom sont les plus prestigieuses offertes à Bishop's. D'une valeur de **10 000 \$** par année académique et renouvelables jusqu'à trois ans pour les étudiants du cégep (**30 000 \$**), ou jusqu'à 4 ans pour les étudiants provenant d'une école secondaire canadienne (**40 000 \$**). Les postulants doivent présenter un excellent dossier d'accomplissements académiques, ainsi que des qualités démontrables en ce qui a trait au leadership, à l'entrepreneuriat et à l'engagement communautaire. Les demandes doivent être faites en ligne avant le **1^{er} mars 2026** et nous faire parvenir tous vos documents justificatifs au plus tard le **15 mars 2026**. Nous examinerons ensuite toutes les demandes et octroierons les bourses peu après.

Bourses et prix

Nos bourses et prix sont d'une valeur de **500 \$ à 12 000 \$** par année universitaire. La plupart ne sont offertes qu'aux nouveaux étudiants et ne sont pas renouvelables. Pour que votre candidature soit évaluée, vous devez **remplir votre demande d'admission et la demande de bourse et prix en ligne avant le 1^{er} mars 2026**. Nous examinerons ensuite toutes les demandes et décernerons les bourses à la mi-avril. En plus du dossier scolaire, ces bourses et prix peuvent tenir compte du leadership, des activités parascolaires, de l'implication communautaire et/ou des besoins financiers.

Tuition and Fees

The following are the tuition and fee structures for the 2025-2026 academic year.

Please note that a typical course is worth 3 credits and that most students take 5 courses per semester for a total of 30 credits over one academic year (September to April). Bishop's also offers a condensed Spring/Summer session (May and June). Bishop's undergraduate students enrolled in no fewer than 12 credits per semester will be considered full time. International undergraduate students must be enrolled in a minimum of 12 credits per semester.

Admissions Information & Criteria

The following requirements should be used as guidelines to be considered competitive for admissions consideration. Bishop's University receives more applications each admission cycle than it has available spaces. Meeting the requirements does not guarantee admission. Applicants who do not meet the requirements may be considered on an individual basis. In those and other cases, the Admissions Office may request additional information.

CEGEP

In the process of completing a diploma of college studies (DEC) or have obtained a DEC from a CEGEP in Quebec within the past two years and have not studied elsewhere.

The global R-Score will be used as the admissions average.

R-Score requirement: minimum 24

R-Score requirement (education): minimum 25

Canadian High School

General requirements: Five senior-level (Grade 12 or equivalent) academic courses including English, with a minimum overall admissions average of 80% or equivalent.

Minimum requirement to be considered: Completed high school diploma.

Five Grade 12-level approved academic courses, including pre-university English. A list of approved courses can be found at ubishops.ca/admissions.

Science applicants require two approved Grade 12-level science courses (physics, chemistry, and/or biology).

USA/International High School

General requirements: Five senior-level (Grade 12 or equivalent) academic courses, including English, with a minimum overall admissions average of 80% or a minimum GPA of 3.50 on a 4.00 scale or equivalent.

Minimum requirement to be considered:

Completed high school diploma or equivalent.

We are looking for well-rounded students with strong academic grades and involvement in community and extra-curricular activities.

Submission of SAT/ACT test scores, letters of recommendation, and personal essays, is optional; however, all information submitted will be considered.

Caribbean requirements: Minimum five CSEC subjects and CAPE certification with no grades below a "111."

International Baccalaureate (IB)

Minimum requirement to be considered:

Completed IB diploma.

Theory of Knowledge (TOK) and bonus points are not included in the admissions average calculation.

Minimum anticipated IDP score of 30 required.

IBCP and non-IBDP applicants will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

Baccalauréat Français (BACF)

Minimum requirement to be considered:

Completed Baccalauréat Français Général.

Minimum score of 12.5 required.

British-Patterned (A-Levels) Systems

Minimum requirement to be considered: Five GCSEs and three A-Level examinations. BTEC applicants will be considered on an individual basis.

Minimum of five GCSEs with no grade below "5" or "C" and three A-Levels with a minimum B/B/C score required.

College and University Transfers

Minimum requirement to be considered: In good academic standing at last institution attended.

Latest available transcripts from all post-secondary institutions attended. High School transcripts and a letter outlining the reasons for the transfer may also be requested by the Admissions Office.

Mature Students

Minimum requirement to be considered: Must be at least 21 years old at the start of the semester and have not studied full time for at least two full academic years (four semesters).

Applicants are evaluated on an individual basis and, along with the latest transcript, a curriculum vitae and cover letter must be submitted.

Advanced Credits

University Transfers:

Completed courses deemed to be at a university level with a grade of C or higher are eligible for advanced standing credit. The maximum amount of credit a student can receive is 60 (equivalent to two full years of study). Degree and program restrictions may impact the amount of transfer credit that is possible.

College Transfers:

In addition to having completed courses deemed to be at a university level, college-transfer students must also have completed a diploma program or be in a recognized university-transfer program at a North American institution. Degree and program restrictions may impact the number of credits that can be transferred.

Required documents for transfer credit evaluation: Official transcripts and course outlines or syllabi should be submitted to the Admissions Office.

Required Documents

- Copy of latest transcript
- Supplemental information (personal statement, letters of recommendation, standardized test scores, etc.), while not a requirement, would be considered if submitted as part of the application package. Upon evaluation of your file, the Admissions Office may request additional information.

All documentation can be submitted electronically at time of application or via MyBU once an application is submitted.

CAQ and Study Permit Requirements

International students admitted to Bishop's University must obtain two different immigration documents prior to arriving at Bishop's. Once students obtain their conditional or final letter of admission, they can begin the application procedure. The first step is to complete a CAQ (Quebec Acceptance Certificate) application with the Quebec government (quebec.ca/en/education/study-quebec/temporary-selection-studies). Once the CAQ has been approved, students can apply for a study permit from the Canadian government (canada.ca/en/immigration-refugees-citizenship/services/study-canada).

The process can take anywhere from 5–16 weeks so we encourage students to complete their application for admission early to avoid any delays. The deadline to apply at Bishop's as an international student is **March 1, 2025** for the fall semester and **September 1, 2026** for the winter semester.

Provincial Attestation Letter (PAL)

The purpose of the PAL is to provide confirmation from the province that each applicant has a space for a new study permit application within their allocation. Please note that the student's CAQ will be considered as a PAL and must be included with the study permit application.

English Language Proficiency Requirements

Applicants who have not studied in an English- or French-language curriculum must normally meet our English Language Proficiency (ELP) requirements. **Students must submit scores for only ONE** of the following standard ELP tests:

TOEFL: 90 (Internet based)

IELTS: 6.5

Cambridge English: Proficiency (CPE) – Grade of C or higher

Cambridge English: Advanced (CAE) – Grade of C or higher

CAEL: 70

International Baccalaureate (IB):

Majority of IB diploma courses completed in English or French plus

Language A1 or A2 (HL or SL) final score of 5

Language B (HL or SL) final score of 6

Duolingo English Test (DET): 115+ (Expert Level)

LanguageCert Academic Test: Minimum band score of 70–74 with no individual score less than 65



[Study and Work in Canada]

International students with valid study permits may be able to work on or off campus a maximum of 24 hours per week and full time during scheduled breaks anywhere in Canada, as long as they meet the specific eligibility criteria outlined by the Canadian government. Once they earn their degree from Bishop's, international students could be eligible to obtain a post-graduation work permit, which authorizes them to work in Canada after their studies for up to three years. FAQs

Here are some of the most common questions that we get asked the first weekend before classes start, a.k.a. Move-in Day.

WHY SHOULD I ATTEND ORIENTATION WEEK ?

During the first week of the school year, we host Orientation Week (O-Week), where the Students' Representative Council (SRC) organizes a full week's worth of academic and social events designed to engage new students to help integrate and welcome them into the Bishop's community. From tours around campus with upper-year students, to serenading the Principal, a concert in the quad, scavenger hunts around Lennoxville, and valuable info sessions, there are activities for everyone. It's also an amazing way to get to know other new students.

HOW DO I GET TO MONTREAL/ AIRPORT/TRAIN STATION?

An express, inter-city bus line (Limocar) stops directly on campus on Fridays and takes you to downtown Montreal. On other days of the week, you can catch the city bus (STS) or take a taxi to the bus terminal in Sherbrooke to connect to a Montreal-bound bus. Alternatively, Aeronavette is a privately run shuttle service that will transport you directly to the airport. You can also carpool to your destination with Kangaride or by connecting with other travellers who post on online, B.U.-affiliated groups or social media.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE FUN PLACES TO GO TO IN LENNOXVILLE/SHERBROOKE?

Lennoxville is a dynamic borough of Sherbrooke. Bike trails and walking paths circle and cross town, restaurants dot Queen Street, and amenities such as grocery stores, libraries, bookstores, and shops are steps away from campus. Foodies will delight in the number of cafes, food festivals, and restaurants in greater Sherbrooke (some say that there is a seat in a restaurant for every Sherbrooke dweller). HOW DO I GET TO DOWNTOWN SHERBROOKE OR THE MALL?

Bishop's has two bus routes that come to campus regularly. Hop on the #2 bus to downtown Sherbrooke where you can explore the city centre with many restaurants, shops, pubs, and a movie theatre, or take the #11 bus to the Carrefour de l'Estrie (the mall). Get your bus pass on campus, at Doolittle's Co-op!

CAN I HAVE VISITORS ON CAMPUS?

Yes! The residence team can even provide an extra mattress for your guest. Whether it's another B.U. student or a friend from out of town, you are welcome to have them over. Just let the staff or your RA know for how long.

IS THERE A CURFEW IN RESIDENCE?

No, but living in residence does have its rules and one of them is having designated and enforced quiet hours. From Sunday to Thursday, quiet hours start at 11 p.m. and from Friday to Saturday, they start at 1 a.m. Quiet hours are in place to ensure that all students have an enjoyable time whether they want to stay in or go out. So, no curfew—just quiet hours. We also keep one residence building as our quiet building. Munster features 24/7 quiet hours, making it an easy choice for Gaiters looking for a focused yet relaxing year. Munster is situated farther away from the major hubs on campus, reducing noise and traffic.

CAN I PARK MY CAR ON CAMPUS ? HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

Yes, students are allowed to park their cars on campus. Student parking is located in P2 behind Paterson and the Sports Centre. Understanding University Terms

You’ll come across many new terms as you browse your postsecondary options. Get familiar with common Canadian university terminology with our helpful guide.

Bachelor’s degree: the degree earned upon completion of your undergraduate program. Bachelor’s degrees usually take between three to four years to complete and are typically 120 credits.

Bachelor of Arts (B.A.): the type of degree earned upon completion of any major program in the humanities, most social science majors, a few natural sciences majors, or a major in business.

Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.): the type of degree earned upon completion of this program in one of the available concentrations within the Williams School of Business.

Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.): the type of degree earned upon completion of one of the available concentrations within the School of Education. These concentrations are typically 150 credits and take four to five years to complete.

Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.): the type of degree earned upon the completion of most majors within the Faculty of Natural Sciences & Mathematics and a few majors in the social sciences.

Major: the primary subject that you plan to study. You can combine a major with another major or with a minor or two.

Double major: two separate majors completed concurrently; for example, a major in Psychology and a major in Sociology. (The majors can be complementary or unrelated—you can customize!)

Concentration: a specific, focused area of study. Some degree programs require you to select a concentration from a few different options while other programs offer concentrations that you could add to your major.

Honours: the main subject that you plan to study, done with a high degree of subject concentration, which can include research and seminar courses, and a high standard of academic performance. (It’s good to consider an honours program if you plan to pursue graduate studies.)

Minor: the secondary subject that you plan to study. You can combine a minor or multiple minors with your major for example, a major in Business and a minor in Pre-Law. A minor is typically 24 credits, or 8 courses.

Certificate: typically 30 credits, a certificate is a highly focused program that results in the obtention of a certificate as opposed to a degree.

Micro-Certificate: typically 15 credits, a micro-certificate is a highly focused mini program that results in the obtention of a micro-certificate as opposed to a degree. Micro-certificates can be completed part time or full time.

The School of Education offers four Bachelor of Education degrees. A Bachelor of Education is required to be eligible for a Quebec teaching licence or *brevet d'enseignement*. The School also offers four minors and two graduate programs. As a teaching and learning institution, the School of Education works in collaboration with the greater educational community and is dedicated to developing reflective and exemplary educators. Our graduates are prepared to assume leadership roles in education as a result of theory- and practice-oriented courses founded on the principles of equity, responsibility, and respect for individual dignity.

The Williams School of Business offers two business degree programs: Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.) with multiple major concentrations and a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) with a Major in Business. Both degrees allow students to pursue the co-operative education program to combine relevant work experience and their studies.

B.B.A. – The B.B.A. offers the most in-depth approach to business education. B.B.A. students can also choose among the below major concentrations.

B.A. Major Business – This degree option has been developed for the business-minded student who is pursuing a well-diversified liberal education and wants to complement other disciplines with a business degree. This degree combination is focused on a well-rounded, fundamental business core from all business concentration areas and the flexibility to combine interests.

Joint programs include B.A. Majors in Arts Administration, Information Technology, and Sports Studies.

ACCOUNTING

Major Concentration and Honours

Knowledge of accounting is fundamental to all disciplines in business. The skills acquired in the program prepare students for positions of leadership in organizations spanning all sectors of the economy including senior management, strategic government positions, consulting, teaching, auditing, and finance. ENTREPRENEURSHIP

Major Concentration, Honours, and Minor

This concentration is designed to enable the understanding of the entrepreneurial process of starting, growing and harvesting a new venture. By performing both an in-depth study of the entrepreneurial process and practical assignments, students will learn: how the entrepreneurial mind thinks, how a product/market vision is developed, how an opportunity is assessed, and how resources are harnessed to take advantage of that opportunity, throughout entrepreneurial networks and community.

FINANCE

Major Concentration, Honours, and Minor

Students will learn professional skills and acquire technical and analytical competence to pursue challenging careers in corporate finance, portfolio management, and securities research. In addition to a thorough understanding of the principles of financial management, students will be exposed to both theoretical and practical aspects of investment management, capital budgeting, and risk hedging.

Students who follow the prescribed sequence of courses will be thoroughly prepared to write the Level I Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) examination upon graduation. Students can also compete

in their last two years of study for positions in the SEED Portfolio, a selective program where they manage a real investment fund and gain real-world experience in research, valuation, and portfolio management, supported by experienced industry mentors.

HUMAN RESOURCES

Major Concentration, Honours, and Minor

There is growing recognition that the quality of an organization's human resources plays a strategic role in an ever-changing business environment. With organizations facing the need for continuous change in a competitive environment, they must, more than ever, begin to rely on the knowledge, skills, and abilities of their workforce to confront such challenges. Through courses such as Compensation Management, Human Resource Management, Industrial Relations, Training and Development, Occupational Health and Safety, and Organizational Behaviour, students will learn how to ensure that the Human Resource goals of attracting, developing, and maintaining a competitive workforce are accomplished.
